

Are you REAL★ID'd?

REAL ID is the Department of Homeland Security's rules and standards to improve the integrity and security of state-issued driver licenses and ID cards. This helps fight terrorism and reduce fraud. REAL ID licenses and ID cards have a star in the upper right hand corner.

REAL ID Requirements: You must do this in person and bring specific forms of identification that prove birth, social security number, and residential address. The list below includes the most common documents used. The deadline for compliance is October 1, 2020.

1. Identification: Non-U.S. Immigrant

Documents must be valid for more than 30 days from the date of issuance.

Bring **one:**
(original
or certified
copy)

- Valid employment authorization card issued by the United States Department of Homeland Security (Form-I688B or I-766)
- Proof of non-immigrant classification provided by United States Department of Homeland Security (If an application is pending, show evidence when it was applied for and status on date the DHS received the application)
- If petition is pending, show evidence that the petition was applied for while in legal status

Name Change: If you have legally changed your name by marriage or court order, you must have your name changed on your Citizen and Immigration Services (CIS) documents.

2. Social Security Number

Bring **one original:** (that show your complete name and social security number)

- Social Security Card (must be an original in your current full name)
- W-2 Form
- Paycheck/stub showing Social Security Number
- 1099 Form
- If you do not have a Social Security Number: Bring a letter from the Social Security Administration indicating that you were never issued one. In addition, you will need to present at least one proof of ID from the following list:
 - School record stating date of birth, which must contain the registrar's signature
 - Transcript of the birth record filed with a public officer charged with the duty of recording certificates
 - An insurance policy on the customer's life that has been in force for at least two years and has the month, day, and year of birth
 - Florida Vehicle Registration certificate or out-of-state registration certificate (if name and date of birth are shown)
 - Florida driver license record, Florida identification card record, or receipt copy of your last Florida driver license issuance
 - Immigration Form I-571
 - Marriage certificate
 - Court order, which includes legal name
 - Parental consent form of minor, signed by the parent or legal guardian
 - Government issued out-of-country passport, driver license, or identification card

3. Residential Address (not post office box)

Your current driver license or ID card cannot be used as proof of residential address. Internet printouts or faxes of these documents are acceptable.

Bring **two:**
(Remember, both of these documents must be in your name)

- Deed, mortgage, or rental agreement
- Florida vehicle registration or title (order a duplicate at www.pbctax.com)
- Utility bill or hookup/work order (not more than two months old)
- Form DS-2019, Certificate of Eligibility for Exchange Visitor (J-1) status
- Mail from Federal, State, County or City government agencies (not more than two months old)



Note: The U.S. Department of Homeland Security, Department of Citizenship and Immigration Services define a Non-Immigrant as an alien who seeks temporary entry to the United States for a specific purpose. Non-immigrants include tourists, temporary workers, business executives, students, and diplomats.
